NatureHood encourages young Canadians to discover and connect with nature in their own backyard, with a focus on increasing access to green space for kids and youth from marginalized and underserved communities.

NatureHood works with partner organizations to break down barriers to accessing nature through the facilitation of interpretive programs and classroom activities focused on exploration, education, stewardship, and nature conservation.

Through immersive experiences that connect kids and families with the natural world around them, NatureHood sparks curiosity, educates, and cultivates a lifelong love for local ecosystems—nurturing the next generation of nature stewards and outdoor leaders.

By empowering youth with leadership opportunities while in nature, NatureHood transforms awareness of environmental issues into action—cultivating the confidence, initiative, and agency required to lead future projects that halt and reverse nature loss.

NatureHood is built on the belief that access to nature should be a right, not a privilege. The program works to make outdoor spaces more inclusive, equitable, and accessible for everyone.

Nature Canada's Race and Nature in the City report is a community-informed needs assessment that provides key recommendations designed to address barriers to nature and engage underserved youth in nature-based programming. Nature Canada has mobilized its Nature Network with the goal of implementing the recommendations listed in the report, and has engaged the nature community more broadly through workshops and webinars featuring the report's authors and other experts.

At first, they struggled, but once they got the ID of the call down, they were able to point it out by themselves. They then learned about snags and could easily identify them throughout the park and explain why they are so important! During our outing participants also learned firsthand how to use Merlin and iNaturalist and how valuable these ecology apps are. Participants were able to download the apps and use them in their preferred language. Attendees were impressed and showed enthusiasm for using the apps independently.
